fter a turbulent childhood, a traumatic marriage and the loss of her sense of self, Pamela "PJ" Elsmore embarked on a journey around the world in search of truth. When at last she found it, she returned home to Australia, where life hasn't been the same since.

PJ shares with Challenge News that early on in her life, her family immigrated to Perth, Western Australia, from New Zealand and not long after that, her parents divorced.

"There was lots of love from our parents, but there was a loss of the security of that nuclear family," PJ shares.

PJ's mother began a relationship with a man who had alcohol issues and, fearing for their safety, PJ, her mother and sister went into hiding. When PJ's mother met and married a new man, life didn't improve.

"They married when I was 12. I cried through the whole service. Something died inside of me and I believe that was the end of my childhood at that moment. There was a lot of abuse in my parents'

relationship and it was like being in a nightmare," PJ says. "[I experienced] sexual abuse, verbal abuse and emotional abuse."

PJ and her sister would visit their father every second weekend, until he started a new relationship, when the visits dropped to once a month.

"Then they got married and moved away and then it was every holidays.

"So he became more and more absent, which was upsetting for me as I was very close to my dad. His new wife was emotionally abusive too. And neither parent protected me from the behaviour of their spouses."

When PJ was five, before her parents split up, she had an experience that she consistently referred back to throughout her life.

"My dad had put me to bed, I had my little cat on the end of my bed and I was lying there, ready to go to sleep and I heard this voice about a foot from my face in the darkness say, 'Pamela, I love you.'"

Her father had left the room and there was no one else in her house that it could have been.

"I thought, 'That's God!' I just

knew in my spirit it was God."

After that, PJ began writing letters to God, telling Him about her life. Her faith was further strengthened when she attended a Scripture Union camp when she was 11.

"I gave my heart to Jesus at that camp. When I heard the gospel message, I knew that was what I wanted. I wanted to say yes to Jesus."

PJ recalls praying a prayer of salvation (similar to the one on page 11).

She was attending an Anglican church with her mother and sister at the time and made the decision to be baptised and receive Communion.

"Later on in my life, I was to go back to that experience as a fiveyear-old of God speaking to me and my baptism, because I nearly left my faith altogether," she admits.

In her teenage years, PJ recalls

multiple spiritual encounters at various churches and youth groups. At 18 she started attending a church and joined the music team.

the Bible? Righto. How scientifically plausible is a virgin birth? How about the chemistry of water becoming (very good) wine in an instant? What about paralysed people walking, a guy who was dead for four days and beginning to stink, coming to life (Lazarus); a man blind from birth, seeing; a man walking on water; two bits of fish and five loaves of bread being enough to feed more than 5000 people?

"I ended up meeting a guy and we got married, but he wasn't a Christian. He also had alcohol and anger issues. It lasted about four years, but during that time I was losing a sense of myself. I was going to church but I was living in the world as well. The church was a bit of a social club, we didn't have heart conversations. I would sometimes play music at church while still being intoxicated from nightclubbing the night

before." At the same time, she was asking questions about the Bible and sin but her questions went unanswered.

PJ admits she was living a double life a n d questioned whether the church and Christianity were for her. When her marriage fell apart, more doubts crept in.

"So I started to pray, 'If You're real, God, show me, Reveal Yourself to me so that I'll know You better. And while You're at it, reveal me to me because I don't know who I am anvmore.'

About two years later, when PJ embarked on a trip around the world, God answered her prayer.

In England she visited a church that took her in and, through reading the Bible, praying and input from church members, her faith was restored. PJ says God revealed Himself to her and confronted her with her sin (wrongdoings and selfseeking) and she prayed for God's forgiveness and surrendered her life to Him.

"I finally had a proper relationship with Jesus. I'd been lovingly disciplined by the Father and I'd been placed in this community of people who loved me."

Since then, PJ's life hasn't

always been smooth sailing. She married a man she met at Bible College but the relationship broke down a short time later. "It was

very traumatic," she shares.

But she turned to God in her pain and asked Him to guide her.

PJ has now happily remarried and lives, works and attends church in Perth. She also volunteers with a prison ministry (she regularly leads music at a maximum security men's prison chapel service, and marks Bible studies and writes letters of encouragement to prison inmates). She also leads a workplace evangelistic prayer team in the city.

IN 2006 I had the privilege to climb Mount Kilimanjaro. Part of our preparation was to hear the account of and receive some valuable tips from a man who had done the climb the year before. Even though it gave us a better picture of what to expect, the experience at the end of the day far outweighed just talking and dreaming about this adventure. In the same way, we can grow up hearing about other people's experiences of faith and God, but until we set out ourselves to find God, we will never really understand what they are describing.

We can grow up in a Christian home, go to church, and hear about other people's relationship with Jesus, but it is not the same as having the life changing experience ourselves when we surrender our lives to Christ, ask His forgiveness for our sins and make Him the Lord of our lives.

Then we will start to understand what Christians mean when they say they: feel washed clean and new; have unquenchable joy; experience inexplicable peace; and feel that everything is suddenly more beautiful.

In Jeremiah 29: 13 God says, "You will seek Me and find Me, when you search for Me with all your heart." What a wonderful promise! Christianity is not a set of rules and Bible stories, but a relationship with a living and loving God. God uses the foolish things of this world to confound those who think they are wise. Looking at the above examples, you could say it is foolish to believe the Bible - and many people do, dismissing it completely on the basis of scientific rationalism.

Ok. Where does that leave us? Is it any more logical and scientifically rational to believe that the whole universe exploded out of nothing, by accident? Or that our intricate genetic code evolved out of chemicals with no process or design? Or that the beauty we see all around us in nature is random and accidental?

By discarding the Bible as ridiculous, materialistic thinking does not take away our problems of logic, it just creates new, and I would argue much more difficult, problems to grapple with.

Where does creativity come from? What is love and why do we do it? What makes us, us? There is more to the world than science, logic and what we can perceive with our senses. Christians are not the only ones to argue that.


And once we admit that scientific plausibility cannot be the only arbiter of truth, then the whole basis for rejecting Genesis as fact collapses.

## THE MOST DANGEROUS Journalist **EVENT IN HISTORY**

FOR most people today, Easter is a long weekend spent with friends and family. But as British Journalist Peter Hitchens once pointed out, the first Easter contains the most dangerous ideas in human history. Here are 10 of them:

#### 1) The first Easter shows that we are worse than we imagined...

We, modern people, love to think of ourselves as "good people", especially when comparing ourselves to rapists, robbers, and dictators. But on that first Easter, Jesus Christ died on a Roman cross. He did it because it was the only way to reconcile sinful, rebellious humanity to a Holy God (Matt 26:39). All our self-esteem training can't change this awful reality: we all fall short of God's perfect standards (Romans 3:23).

2) ... But we are more loved than we could ever hope

Despite being worse than we imagined, that first Easter proved God's love for us.

A love that doesn't paper over our worst features: but a love that sees us at our worst, and gives us His best "But God

demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8)

#### 3) Our identity is ultimately given to us, not something we invent

We live in the age of authenticity, where our inner feelings determine our identity. But in the final analysis, our inner feelings are not who we really are. Our ultimate identity is that of God's image-bearers, albeit fallen and rebellious. But on that first Easter, Jesus opened up the door to a mind-blowing new identity: sons and daughters of the living God (Galatians 4:4-7).

#### 4) Judgement Day is coming (and has already begun)

On that first Easter, Jesus' tomb was empty.

He rose from the dead, just as He promised. He's now at God's right hand, ruling the universe, and will one day return to Judge everyone in it (Acts 17:31). Including us.

But for those in Christ Jesus, we've already passed through judgement, from death to life (Colossians 3:1-4).

#### 5) The universe is not

meaningless chaos Jesus' resurrection proves that He is who He says He is:

God's appointed King, who made the world, and rules the world (Matthew 28:18). Thus, our universe is not random chaos (and never was). It's under Jesus' rule.

6) Life is about God's Story, not our story

Disney is wrong: life is not ultimately about following our dreams, and doing whatever turns us on.

God is unfolding His story for the universe. He's the Hero. And our job is to get on board with Him.

After all, it's the best story ever told.

#### 7) Life has intrinsic meaning

Modern people believe that we make up our own meaning.

Mike Vogel as Chicago Tribune reporter Lee Strobel in the movie based on his most important story to date: The Case for Christ.

f you're a committed atheist and your spouse becomes a follower of Jesus, it might just rock your world. That's what happened to hardnosed Chicago Tribune legal affairs editor Lee Strobel, who marshalled his skills in journalism and law to find out what had happened to his wife, Leslie.

Strobel's quest became a bestselling book, The Case for Christ, and now a movie. He writes that Leslie's 1979 announcement stunned him. He felt "like the victim of a bait-and-switch scam. I had married one Leslie - fun... carefree...risk-taking – and now I feared she was going to turn into some sort of sexually repressed prude who would trade our upwardly mobile lifestyle for all-night prayer vigils and volunteer work in grimy soup kitchens."

"Instead," he continues, "I was pleasantly surprised - even fascinated - by the fundamental changes in her character, her integrity, and her personal confidence." He aimed to investigate faith from top to bottom to see if it made sense.

The film stars Mike Vogel (The Help), Erika Christensen (Frasier, Traffic) and Oscar-winner Faye Dunaway (Bonnie and Clyde, Network). (Spoilers ahead.)

#### **Rigorous methods; avoiding pitfalls**

Educated at the University of Missouri School of Journalism and Yale Law School, Lee determined to use the rigorous methods a veteran journalist and legal analyst

would about a court case: sifting evidence, evaluating reliability, considering alternatives. He studied history, archaeology, and ancient literature and interviewed experts.

Lee wanted to avoid pitfalls he had experienced earlier in his career when an apparently clear-cut court case he was covering had its guilty verdict reversed. In retrospect, he realised he had been viewing the facts through preconceived biases that blinded him from objective evaluation. He determined to study from a fresh perspective the faith he had thought was a fairy tale.

For nearly two years he asked hard questions about source reliability, about Jesus' life, death and alleged Resurrection, and more.

The book and the film present what he discovered, not as academic treatises - though the book is well written for thinking readers, and extensively documented - but in the context of colorful, touching stories about how he wrestled with his findings.

sive corroboration by ancient historians and others," and for the assertion that "archaeology underscores their trustworthiness."

Regarding Jesus, he found multiple attestations that Jesus claimed deity. Jesus' "I and the Father are one" New Testament claim is echoed by contemporary friends... and even enemies, who accused Him of blasphemy for an assertion they considered outrageous.

Lots of mentally disturbed people believe they are God. Was Jesus one of them? Lee says Jesus' discourses display "no sign of dementia, delusions, or paranoia." Rather they evidence "profound wisdom...uncanny insights... poetic eloquence, and...deep compassion."

Jesus fulfilled many Hebrew prophecies regarding the Jewish Messiah. Lee cites Peter Stoner, a mathematician who calculated the probability of just eight of these coming true in one person as one chance in 1017.

#### Empty tomb; a little girl's wish

And Lee found convincing evidence that Jesus was executed, buried, and returned to life. The tomb was empty and many eyewitnesses said they saw Him alive again, some at the cost of their lives.

He concluded, "The atheism I had embraced for so long buckled under the weight of historical truth... It would require much more faith for me to maintain my atheism than to trust in Jesus of Nazareth!"


He asked Jesus to forgive him and become his personal friend in 1981.

#### A matter of truth not taste

DAVID Platt in his book 'Radical', makes a helpful observation of religious life in the modern west.

Platt notes that we live in a society where everyone is seen as equal; of equal worth and standing. The extension of this belief is that every idea is of equal value. Platt writes, 'Just as every person is equally valued, so every idea is equally valued.

If all ideas are equally valued, Platt reasons that faith and belief become a matter of taste not a matter of truth. Belief about God and the origins of our world should not be a matter of taste, but rather a search for what is true.

We should treat this as an important issue to study and research.

Faith and belief are not lifestyle choices; they ought to be the end result of careful consideration and reflection.

## My scars do not define me

echi Okwuchi was 16 years old when she survived a horrific plane crash in Nigeria, which left her with third degree burns on more than 65 percent of her body. Refusing to give up, Kechi drew strength from faith, family and music, and eventually inspired people around the world when she appeared on America's Got Talent. She recently released new music and a book detailing her painful but hopeful story.

In an interview with the 700 Club, Kechi shares what she remembers of the plane crash in 2005.

"I was heading home for the Christmas holidays with 60 other students from my high school along with other passengers," Kechi recalls.

"There were 109 of us on the plane including the flight crew. I remember it being a very regular flight until it just suddenly wasn't. [There was] about 15 minutes left in the flight when the pilot started to descend."

That's when the turbulence started and panic rippled throughout the plane.

"Everyone was panicking, screaming and praying - it was just chaos inside the cabin. The last thing I remember is

holding my friend's hand. She was in the aisle seat next to mine. There was this really loud scraping metal sound that jars the brain - that's the last thing I remember before the darkness took over and I guess at that point that's when the plane crashed.'

Kechi's next memory was five weeks later when she awoke from a coma in a hospital in Johannesburg. She went on to discover she was one of two survivors of the plane crash and was now covered in third-degree burns.



In her new book, More Than My Scars, Kechi recalls seeing her face for the first time since the crash. "My whole face looked like one huge

scar," she writes. "Therefore, to hide the scar would be to hide my entire face, and I wasn't going

to do that. "In a way, reality

had forced me to choose between two extremes. I could either hide totally from the world or show myself totally to the world. I was forced to either completely accept myself or completely reject myself. The plane crash has altered my face and body, but it did not take the essence of who I was.

Kechi's mother stayed by her bedside in the hospital and her Christian faith began to inspire Kechi. Before the accident, Kechi viewed Christianity and church as an "obligatory part of my life".

"It was just something I took for granted, something that I had because my parents believed it. It wasn't anything personal until after the accident when I got to a place where I had to kind of redefine what it means to be a Christian for myself. For the first time I had to decide what God meant to me and have the interest in developing something direct and personal with him as opposed to an indirect faith that I had from my mom."

something that gave me peace on the inside and translated into the outside as well ..

"After I left the hospital and [faced] the world again, I needed that peace and assurance to live my life as normally as possible. That's what allowed me to face different difficulties in this world with confidence because I knew that I wasn't doing it alone ... In every phase of my life, I learned that it's so much easier when God is involved."

After putting her faith and trust in Jesus, Kechi began to see herself through different eves

"God gave me the ability to see the part

of me that went beyond my physical appearance, the part of me that mattered most," Kechi writes in her book.

"He had shown me Kechi through his eyes, and she was beautiful. This was the very moment that birthed a phrase that would become my life motto: My scars do not define me. There was much more to my identity than that. I am more than my scars. No one, but God showed me that."

A surprising change that occurred after Kechi's accident was that her voice changed.

"It sounded different from before the plane crash," Kechi tells wonderfullymade.org.

"No one understands why... Music then became this thing that I could not only enjoy but sing along to my favorite songs with more confidence. It was so nice to have this good thing.

"It didn't seem like a lot, but in a sea of negatives, having that was so important to me because it was one good thing that weirdly came out of this, so I ran with it. It became such a big part of my healing.'

In 2017, Kechi appeared on the television program, America's Got Talent, and she found herself singing in the finals of the competition and sharing her story with thousands of people around the world.

The following year Kechi released her debut single, Don't You Dare and became a burn

survivor advocate for multiple organisations, including the burns hospital she was treated at in America. In 2019, Kechi became a finalist on the

premiere season of America's Got Talent: The Champions through Simon Cowell's golden buzzer.

Kechi released her memoir More Than My Scars in March 2022 and her self-titled debut album is currently streaming on all digital music platforms.

"It seemed clear Jesus was at least a person of history who walked the roads of Palestine in the first century, and apparently His story was compelling enough that these ancient followers of His believed it, and even suffered for preaching His death and resurrection. ... I knew that at some point I would need to give a

coherent account of who I thought Jesus in fact was. But all of this was nowhere near changing my view or my life habits."

realized a truth I knew but had worked very hard to suppress ... me, that is why Jesus had to die: ... me ... He took upon Himself the penalty that I deserved, so that in God's justice, my sins would be forgiven freely, by grace as a gift, rather than by my righteous deeds or religious rituals ... So I accepted the whole thing: I placed my trust in Jesus, and asked Him to forgive me in the way the New Testament promised He would."

This massive step had a significant impact on Guillaume's life. "The guilt was gone, and I received the freedom and forgiveness Jesus promised. This whole story of mine started to make sense and exhibit purpose: I had experienced the living God, who revealed Himself to me in the person of Jesus Christ. I was all in."

Guillaume has since earned a PhD in systematic and philosophical theology, got mar-

In an interview with wonderfullymade.org, Kechi said she chose God as her "resting place".

"Learning to pray, delve deep, and understand Him was a very new experience for me because I'd never done anything like that prior to the accident. I was quickly learning that there was a peace that came with knowledge of Him and seeking Him out in prayer that I could never get anywhere else.

"This is coming from someone who was constantly laving down, medicated, and struggling, whether it's a pain, itching, or discomfort in one way or another. I was always uncomfortable inside my physical body, but there was something that prayer and seeking God, like what it did for me on the inside, translated into the outside as well.

"That peace, knowledge, assurance of His protection, and the fact that He's listening to you and He's with you on this journey of life is national league, travelling across France every weekend for games. "All in all, I was pretty happy with my life, and in a thoroughly secular culture, the chances of ever hearing (let alone believing) the Gospel were incredibly slim." Then one holiday he became romantically involved with an American woman who believed

in God.

Even worse "she believed that sex belonged only in marriage (an even more problematic belief than theism, if it was at all possible)." This relationship got Guillaume "thinking about [faith]. What good reason was there to think God exists, and what good reason was there to think atheism was true instead?

"My own unbelief ... was more a reasonable life assumption than the conclusion of a solid argument ... So I started to take the question seriously, to objectively assess its credibility."

In order to do so, he began reading the Bible and prayed to God as an "experiment".

'If there is a God, then here I am, I'm looking into this, why don't You go ahead and reveal Yourself to me? I'm open.' I wasn't

Guillaume couldn't visit a church because he was travelling every weekend for volleyball.

However, two weeks later his shoulder became so inflamed he couldn't play, so he decided to go to church "to see what those Christians do when they get together

... Frankly, I went to that church like I would go to the zoo: to see some weird exotic animals that

I had read about in books ... I remember thinking that if any of my friends or family could see me there in the building (a church!) I would die of shame." At the end of the service Guillaume spoke to the pastor and this opened up a series of dialogues between the two.

"He gave me a study guide he had written, which laid out the basics of the Christian faith ... I went through this thoroughly at home." But although Christianity began to make sense, Guillaume still wondered "why did Jesus have to die?" In response to his question, "God

reactivated my conscience. That was not a pleasant experience. I suddenly

ried, and now has children.

He concludes: "I was not looking for God; I did not seek Him, and I didn't want Him. He reached out to me, loved me while I was still a sinner, broke down my defenses, and decided to pour out His undeserved grace (love), that His Son might be glorified, and that, from my

sin I may be saved by grace through faith, and not by works; it is the gift of God, so that no one may boast (Eph. 2:8-9). That's the Gospel, and it's good news worth believing."

## **MY FAITH GREW FROM MY DOUBTS**

or many people, no matter what they believe, doubt can creep in and threaten to derail their faith. Question after question arises until it seems there is nothing left to hold onto. Is it possible to overcome doubt despite unanswered questions?

Bobby Conway found that it was and that in fact his season of doubt was a positive in his life.

Age 19 was the first turning point in Bobby's life. Prior to this he describes himself as "insecure, angry, confused, uneducated, promiscuous, a boozer, addictive, foolish, rebellious, and a decent baseball player," according to his website bio.

Then his college baseball teammate took Bobby to hear a Christian speaker called Greg Laurie.

"I resonated with Greg – a recovering pothead, laid back, and a blue jean-wearing Bible-teaching evangelist," he says on his website.

"His message resonated and soon afterward I was following Jesus."

Bobby's newfound faith was strong and he never imagined he would wrestle with doubts in his faith in the future.

"Typical of that honeymoon season falling in love with Jesus, I had a great zeal for the Lord," Bobby shares with Pastor Jason Jimenez in an episode of the Challenging Conversations podcast. "But the further I kept growing in this

Christian faith, and the deeper I kept going into it as it relates to studying philosophy and apologetics, I started to bump into some questions that I had a hard time resolving.'

Bobby pored over books to try and find immediate, simple answers to his complex queries, but there often weren't any.

"For every book that I tried to read to chase down the answer to my doubts, I would collect 10 more questions and more doubts, and the snowball kept growing."

When Bobby started Bible College, he hoped his theological questions would finally be answered. But the doubts remained and he felt exhausted from all the different questions.

Even after graduating seminary and becoming a church pastor and apologist (someone who defends the Christian faith), he still secretly battled doubts. He recalls crying out in prayer, "God, I'm struggling to believe this.

didn't know how to live. I thought: 'What if I've been duped?' I gave myself to this Christian worldview. I threw myself all in it, prepared myself for ministry, and now, my brain is producing questions way faster than I can track down the answers to." Bobby's second turning point was five years ago when, he says, God "broke into my dark night of the soul" and removed his doubts.

He now looks back at his time of deep doubt as positive and beneficial to his life as an apologist.

> "[It had] got to a point when I was in that agony that I had to imagine how to live again. If I wasn't going to be a Christian, where do I go? And so I would envision, 'Well, what if I was an atheist? What if I was an agnostic? What if I was a Buddhist? What if I was whatever?' I would think about what it would be like to live in that

worldview and what type of questions and doubts I would inherit. And then, I would just try to resolve those, and when all was said and done, it was like I broke out, and it was like Christianity seemed like the greatest, and the strongest, and the most beautiful and the most wonderful worldview of them all.'

"It was like, 'Wow, God, You didn't leave me, You didn't abandon me. You really were there," he shares.

"It meant so much to me because I just

was raised in a Christian household, but as I got older, I grew sceptical. Why,

of all the religions, would Christianity be true? These initial doubts grew alongside the decline of my mental health, most of which stemmed from extreme insecurity. At home, I was told that I was precious and loved by God, but at school, I was told that I was ugly and that my value depended on my relationship status. The bullying only intensified when, at age 13, my first boyfriend leaked explicit pictures of me.

When the photos leaked, I lost a ton of friends. I tried to reclaim some sense of self-worth by pouring my energy into extracurricular

activities and trying to get straight As in even the hardest classes. I aimed to combat the judgment and gossip by achieving "perfection". I managed the pressure for a bit, but I eventually fell victim to both panic attacks and self-harm. Then, towards the end of highschool, I started partying. My then-boyfriend and I partied every weekend ... drinking and doing other things we shouldn't have been doing. With each passing week, I felt like I was losing more and more of myself - and even my touch with reality.

At this point, I was still sceptical of my childhood faith, but I wanted direction from a higher power of some sort. I decided to examine religion as a whole.

I listened to a bunch of testimonies and quickly found that the Christian testimonies

stood out. Every story of healing - from schizophrenia to various types of demonic possession - was centred on Jesus. Similarly, everyone with a documented near-death experience claimed to have met the same God — the God of the Bible.

Then came the overwhelming evidence for the resurrection of Jesus. I learned a lot about this from Lee Strobel, a reporter

who began investigating Christianity in the hopes of disproving the resurrection. After interviewing a slew of historians and archaeologists, he surrendered his life to Christ. Like me, he doubted the faith – until he investigated for himself.

I knew, deep in my gut, that Jesus was the truth. I started trying to pursue a relationship with Him, but my relationship with my



once loved became nearly intolerable. As I realized this, God placed an image in my head of His shed blood pouring into my heart and renewing me, day by day. I turned that image into a painting.







grew up in a messed up, dysfunctional home with totally absent parents. Although we were brought up as 'Christians' we were only Christian because we were nothing else; none of us knew God at all. I grew up with extremely strict parents; my dad was a very short-tempered, angry man. Although he never laid a finger on us, he was verbally abusive. I spent a lot of time alone and it was during these times that I'd do my "self-help" thinking. I'd spent hours meditating on my flaws and coming up with improvement plans. Looking back, recognising that I was flawed was a key turning point; I was onto something, but my efforts were futile. Something was missing.

One night, like usual, my friends and I got high, then went our separate ways. I was alone in my dorm room, thinking about life, when I heard commotion downstairs. It sounded like the police were present, yet, for some reason, I felt pushed to throw on my jacket and go scope it out. I expected to find a chaotic scene, but when I got downstairs, I found nothing but

silence. I was weirded out and didn't want to return to my room, so I went for a walk.

I eventually settled in at a picnic table. There, I realized that it was freezing outside, but because of my coat, I wasn't the least bit cold. I didn't have much growing up, so this coat, which was gifted to me by an uncle, really meant a lot to me. I was sitting there, expressing gratitude, from a totally secular standpoint, when I was suddenly enveloped in this overpowering, indescribable feeling of warmth, comfort, love, and total acceptance. In that moment, God revealed Himself to me, an anti-theist. I felt Him say "I'm here" and that I didn't

have to try so hard to fix myself. I immediately and suddenly believed that my own efforts were in vain, but that this Person I had encountered could and would help me.

Then, as crazy confirmation, this beautiful leaf fell before me. It was a curled, slightly broken maple leaf. They were almost as shocked as I was! I now knew that God was real and, though I used the term "Christian," I wasn't really sure which faith tradition, if any, was true. I didn't want to just default to Christianity. After reading everything I could get my hands on about a variety of faiths, I relaxed into what I knew was true: Jesus was Lord. The historical evidence, especially as it relates to the resurrection, was overwhelming. On top of that, all of the other traditions depended on man's own ability to overcome sin and gain spiritual enlightenment - something that human brokenness simply doesn't allow. Christianity is the only tradition predicated upon grace alone. It was obvious ... Jesus was the only way. And this truth couldn't be reconciled with any other faith system. I began to walk with Christ. That was seven years ago. Since, my faith has only continued to grow. This growth has nothing to do with my own righteousness or my own efforts; like every other child of God, I am dependent on God's grace - the same grace that chased me down and brought me out of darkness and into His marvellous light.

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## Astrophysicist's atheism upended

ormer atheist Sarah Salviander, is a research scientist in astronomy and astrophysics at the University of Texas. She was born in the United States but brought up in an atheist household in Canada.

"My parents were socialists and political activists who thought British Columbia would be a better place for us to live, since it had the only socialist government in North America at the time. My parents were also atheists, though they preferred that label in favour of "agnostic". They were kind, loving, and moral, but religion played no part in my life. Instead, my childhood revolved around education, particularly science. I remember how important it was to my parents that my brother and I did well in school," Sarah recounts.

"I grew up in the 1970s and 1980s, a time when science fiction was enjoying a renaissance, thanks largely to the popularity of Star Wars. I remember how fascinated I was by the original Star Wars trilogy ... it got me thinking about space in a big way."

Sarah was also particularly fond of the well-known astronomer Carl Sagan's space series Cosmos: "The combination of these influences led to such an intense wonder about outer space and the universe." At the age of nine, Sarah knew she "would be a space scientist someday".

"In retrospect," she continues, "It's amazing that for the first 25 years of my life, I met only three people who identified as Christian. My view of

Christianity was negative from an early age, and by the time I was in my twenties I was actively hostile toward Christianity. Looking back, I realized a lot of this was the unconscious absorption of the

general hostility toward Christianity that is common in places like Canada and Europe; my hostility certainly wasn't based on actually knowing anything about Christianity.

"I had come to believe that Christianity made people weak and foolish; I thought it was philosophically trivial. I was ignorant not only of the Bible, but also of the deep philosophy of Christianity and the scientific discoveries that shed new light on the origins of the universe and life on Earth."

Sarah focused her energy on her studies and academic pursuits, "I became very dedicated to my physics and math courses. I joined campus

clubs, started to make friends, and, for the first time in my life. I was

lines of evidence to confirm it.

"My group was studying deuterium abundances in the early universe. Deuterium is an isotope of hydrogen, and its abundance in the early universe is sensitive to the amount of ordinary mass contained in the entire universe. Believe it or not, this one measurement tells us whether the big bang model is correct."

S h e was "astounded by this, blown away, completely and utterly awed. It seemed incredible to me that there was a way to find the answer to this question we had about the universe. In fact, it seems that every question we

have about the universe is answerable.

"There's no reason it has to be this way, and it made me think of [Albert] Einstein's observation that the most incomprehensible thing about the world is that it's comprehensible.

"I started to sense an underlying order to the universe. Without knowing it, I was awakening to what

Psalm 19 tells us so clearly, "The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands."

a philosophically deep examination of forgiveness and God's role in giving justice. I was surprised by this, and was starting to realize that the concept of God and religion was not as philosophically trivial as I had thought."

Sarah soon came to the view that belief in God is unavoidable. She was "walking across that beautiful La Jolla campus. I stopped in my tracks when it hit me - I believed in God! I was so happy; it was like a weight had been lifted from my heart.

"I realized that most of the pain I'd experienced in my life was of my own making, but that God had used it to make me wiser and more

and I found myself overwhelmingly drawn to those qualities."

This man, like her, had grown up in an atheist home but later had "come to embrace God and Jesus Christ as his personal Savior in his early twenties through an intensely personal experience."

After they were married, Sarah finished her degree and they had a year apart when she had to move to Austin, Texas for her graduate work in astrophysics. One day while browsing a local bookstore, she came across a title called *The* Science of God authored by the Jewish physicist Gerald Schroeder: "I was intrigued by the title, but something else compelled me to read it. Maybe it was the loneliness

I was feeling, and I was longing for a deeper connection with God. All I know is that what I read changed my life forever."

Schroeder as a unique individual: "He is an MITtrained physicist and also an applied theologian. ... His work proved to me that Genesis 1 was

scientifically sound, and not just a "silly myth" as atheists believed. I realized that, remarkably, the Bible and science agree completely."

Sarah then read the gospels of the

"Not long after, my husband fell ill with meningitis and encephalitis, and it was not clear if he would recover; we didn't know if he would be paralysed or worse. It took him about a month, but, thankfully, he did recover."

Sarah and her husband then went through the loss of their child.

"At that time, we were expecting our first child, a baby girl. All seemed well until about six months, when our baby stopped growing. We found out she had Trisomy 18, a fatal chromosomal abnormality. Our daughter, Ellinor, was stillborn soon after. It was the most devastating loss of

our lives. For a while I despaired, and didn't know how I could go on after the death of our daughter.

"But I finally had a clear vision of our little girl in the loving arms of her heavenly Father, and it was then that I had peace. I reflected that, after all these trials in one year, my husband and I were not only closer to each other, but also felt closer to God. My faith was real.'

Sarah reflects: "I don't know how I would've coped with such trials when I was an atheist. When you're 20 years old and healthy, and you have your family around you, you feel immortal. I never thought about my own death or the potential deaths of loved ones.

"But there comes a time when the feeling of immortality wanes, and you're forced to confront the inevitability of not only your own annihilation, but that of your loved ones."

Sarah concludes: "The only way we are free is if the universe and everything in it was created, not by some

### Cheesecakes and creation

I'VE been practising making my mother's baked



cheesecake recipe for a while, and I am told it is bearing good fruit.

Now think about this. The chef follows a recipe, or a process, or a code, that is designed to produce a perfect cheesecake. The ingredients do not become a cake just by themselves if we wait long enough. The right amount of time is part of the process - I discovered that when I forgot the cake was in the oven, but fortunately my wife Denise, instead of the fire brigade, came to the rescue.

In the same way, considering the origin of life, molecules are not going to become people by evolution, just by waiting long enough. Even after any amount of time, if there is no design, there can be no people.

The cheesecake recipe is an intelligent code that is separate from the ingredients. The flour, sugar, butter and cheese have no idea that they are on their way to becoming cheesecake. The key is this: the property of being a cheesecake does not come from the ingredients. Whenever we see that key, we see the fingerprints of intelligent design.

Another example is seen in the boomerang, which is a specially shaped wooden tool designed so that when thrown, it returns to the thrower. The property of being able to return is not a property of the wood that the boomerang is made of. That is how we know for sure it was designed.


In the same way, our DNA carries a code that does not arise from the DNA itself, and it's a great code that has all the information to make people! The DNA has no idea it is carrying this code. The wood of the boomerang has no idea that it is returning. The flour has no idea it is in a cake.

When we see these, we see clear signs of intelligent creation. So who created people? We know that ultimately, our great God takes the credit for the creation. I thank Him even for the cheesecake. I hope these words help you, as they have me, in your journey to surely trust the Creator.

Sarah still struggled with her faith saying that she "sometimes worried" about it. During this period, she had a cancer diagnosis and an unpleasant course of treatment.



### **Becoming a peacemaker**

ou don't have to look very far in our world today to see how lacking we are in peace and peacemakers.

Right now, as you read this, there are 22 wars being waged around the world, on five separate continents, resulting in the deaths of 120,151 people in 2022 alone. Some of these conflicts have been going on for decades.

Closer to home, many of us have no peace in our personal lives or relationships. Perhaps a friend at school has turned against you or you are no longer speaking to a relative because of an argument neither of you can resolve.

Many people perpetually live their lives with a profound sense of deep sadness, emotional hurt and estrangement from God and people.

Whether it be in our world, or our personal lives, more than ever we need to experience and practice what Jesus taught about peace and being a peacemaker.

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Through His life and teaching, Jesus brought "peace on earth" - and He showed how peace in our relationships with God and others can be a reality in our lives and our world.

Last month I spoke about being a peacemaker and I suggested that one way you could do this was by committing yourself to the "Peace Declaration" I had written. Because I want peace to be more than just a nice sentiment on a piece of paper, I am going to focus on the theme of peace this year.

How can we have peace with God? How can we experience peace in our relationships with others and how can we actively promote peace in them?

You see, I want you to know God's peace deep in your soul.

Being a peacemaker begins with me.

What this means is, if I'm serious about being a peacemaker with others and the world, then I must begin by making peace with God.

People who have peace with God are described by Jesus as being "blessed" people - people who are aware of their need before God and who demonstrate the following characteristics:

• They know they are spiritually bankrupt. To be "poor in spirit" means they know their attitude

toward God doesn't measure up and their relationship with Him is broken. As a result, they turn to God and ask Him for His mercy. • They grieve over their sin. They "mourn" and are in deep grief over the blackness of their own sin against God, as well as

the sins of the world. • They are dependent on God. When Jesus describes blessed people as being "meek", He is not calling them weak. A meek person is someone who knows they are strong, but God is stronger. Instead of living life in their own strength, they choose to live in dependence on God.

A meek person submits themselves completely to God and His care.

• They long for a righteousness they don't have. Blessed people want to be like God. They know they are not good in themselves, so they ask God to fill them with His goodness.

The Apostle Paul wrote, "Having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." (Romans 5:1)

When a person realizes their sin has broken their relationship with God and there is nothing they can do to repair it; when they confess their sin to God, ask for His forgiveness and rely only on the death and resurrection of Jesus to bring this about - that person has peace with God.

God's promise to you is that His Son, Jesus, can bring peace to your life and your relationships, and you can be a peacemaker in our world.

God offers us peace in exchange for our anger, resentments, and fears - He offers you His peace, freely, today.

Blessed are those who realize their need of God because that is the beginning of peace in their lives.

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## HOLINESS

**HOLINESS** is not really a concept bandied about much in our culture today. If the term is used, it would most likely be negatively, as in "Stop being so holier-than-thou!" Meaning, "stop being so self-righteous", or "stop judging me for my bad behaviour".

'Holiness', as far as our culture understands it, is something we think we ought to avoid in order to make others feel better about themselves.

Even exercising a free choice, like not drinking alcohol, not swearing or not sleeping with someone can be construed as some sort of super-spiritual behaviour depending on the company, and elicit an accusation of being too 'holv'.

In the Bible, however, the word 'holy' in the Hebrew language means 'things belonging to God'.

Things and people are 'made holy' by dedicating them for use by and for God.

When God shows up somewhere, like in the Jewish temple or at Moses' burning bush, He transforms that space into a holy place. Even coal shovels and candlesticks can be holy, because they are set aside for use in God's service.

Other words that convey that special use for God's purposes are 'sanctified' or 'consecrated'.

The New Testament calls Christians "a holy people".

Looking around at those who follow Jesus that you know, you might disagree.

But the point is that they are not holy because of what they do, they are holy because they belong to God and God is using them for His purposes.

Christians should indeed act in a manner that is upright and sin-free, but that comes out of the identity of holiness that God has already given them by forgiving their sin and accepting them as His children, not out of a striving on their part to become 'good enough' for God.

The Christian God, Yahweh, is perfect, sinless and all good. God's standards are high and holy. Apart from Jesus' atoning [paying the debt] sacrifice on the cross there is no way humans could meet them.

However, with Jesus as both Savior and Lord of their lives, Christians are empowered to live holy lives - not sanctimonious lives, but lives full of humility, love, kindness, patience and self-control.

You too can be holy and live holy, no matter how you have lived up to this point. You can change the script of your life by committing yourself to God by means of a simple prayer such as the one on this page.

# **STRENGTH IN WEAKNESS**

n 2017, Sheffield policeman Phil Roberts was crowned Britain's Strongest Man.

Winning this competition was no mean feat. The 32-year-old had to beat his opponents in events such as flipping a 880 lbs tractor tyre, lifting a car and pulling a plane. At 6'2 tall and weighing 293 lbs, he was built like a mountain.

Yet while he was as physically as strong as they came, emotionally Phil was as weak as a child.

"It looked on the outside that I had everything, but I didn't feel fulfilled," he says on the YouTube channel Life Stories. "I felt empty."

Emptiness had plagued him ever since he was 22, when his best friend hanged himself.

complaints of anyone in the South Yorkshire Police Force.

Where did it go wrong, he asked himself?

"I went from wanting to help and protect the vulnerable to being one of the most violent men in the force. I left a trail of disaster behind me and slipped into depression."

Phil tried to pick himself up by throwing himself into weight training and competing in novice strongman competitions.

Bolstered by some early victories, he went all out to win the major titles, which resulted in his 2017 win.

This launched him into the glamorous world of women, sports cars, penthouse apartfive huge round stones, increasing in weight from 220 to 353 lbs, and place them on five high platforms.

He got through the first four but slipped while lifting the final and heaviest stone. It dropped.

The 353 lbs rock crashed onto Phil's shin bone, which broke with a sickening crack.

"I knew instantly it was bad," he says. "It sounded like a massive branch breaking off a tree."

When surgeons told him his injuries were so severe he could lose his leg, Phil's world disintegrated.

"I went from being one of the strongest people on earth to the vulnerable little boy I was growing

up. I was terrified," he shares. "All I could think of was that started to change. "I didn't know much about God at all. I thought He was cruel and Jesus was just some kind of nice guy.

"I knew I had to change - I wanted to change - but I was kind of straddling the Christian life and the old life. But God was so gracious; He was so patient. He gave me grace [undeserved love]. He is a loving father, the best Father ever.

"I can genuinely say today that on reflection the day of the accident was the best day of my life, though not at the time, of course. But it was when I realized that all these things that you've spent so much time and effort on can be taken away from you in an instant.

"God has given me the purpose



Until then Phil had been a casual churchgoer, but this tragedy caused him to turn his back on God.

"I couldn't understand how a good God could allow that to happen and that's when I decided I was done with God and would live my life my

way to the full - or at least what I thought was to the full," he says. "I can't say I'm proud of the next 13 years."

Those were the party years, the hard drug (cocaine, heroin, lots of steroids) and hard drinking years.

He even got engaged and bought a house with his fiancée but was unfaithful to her and they broke up.

By this time Phil was a police officer, but had become disillusioned with the job and chalked up the most

ments and lucrative sponsorship deals. But still this

brought him no lasting joy – instead he describes his success as hollow.

His use of hard drugs, which included copious amounts of steroids, continued. In 2019, Phil

decided to defend his title.

By this time, he weighed 335 lbs. "I was having the worst competition I've ever had. I was so big and so uncomfortable because I put on that weight very quickly.

"The steroids and recreational drugs I was taking put my body under huge pressure - it's by the grace of God that I didn't just pop."

The last event of the competition rolled around – the Atlas stone lift, in which competitors have to lift

However, Phil had some friends who were Christians. They reached out to him during this time and invited him to a Christian men's retreat

"At that point I was so desperate I said I'd take anything, so I went, but this time I wasn't my confident cocky self. I was in pain; my leg was being held together by this massive cage. I was miserable."

While he was there, one of the speakers approached Phil and said to him: "Why don't you give this God thing a go? Give Jesus a chance."

Willing to try anything, he said to himself: "Yeah, why not give Jesus a go?" It really was as casual as that! He says slowly but surely things
